Thomas and Samuel Cost stand on Byram's Island. The daughter, **Virginia Dare**, is the first child to be born in North Carolina, the first American settler.

1643

Mrs. Margaret Brent petitions in the Maryland statehouse, the first woman to petition, sue, and appear in court. On her behalf, the government agrees to her petitions, and her lawsuit ends the establishment's control.


1650

Anna Bradstreet's first American poem, "The First American Poem," is first published in what will become the *Devotional Poets*.

1676

Katari Takahashi becomes the "Lady of the Mountains," the woman to be canonized in 1971. She is the first Asian American to be canonized in the Roman Catholic Church.

Sybillic Mactars produces a method of creating socks, and works in London to start the pattern. As with all pattern of this kind, his brand is a mark (his trademark).

1738

Born of white mother and a Creek Indian of mixed blood, **Mary Musgrove** acts as a translator and negotiator for British troops fighting in 1733 when her knowledge of two languages allows her to act as a bridge between the two cultures.

1755

Colonist **Nancy Ward** joins the elite of Seneca. "The 11 Women" (Seneca) give her the right to speak for the people in council. Accompanying the Seneca and Iroquois warriors as they attack the British, she is the only woman to be elected to the Seneca Council, and a woman's spokesman.

1760

Palencia Wright is the first female publisher and editor. She was the first woman to publish a book of poetry, *The Female Spectator*, and the first woman to publish a book of poetry, *The Female Spectator*.

1637

Anna Hutchinson inspires a religious revival in Massachusetts by her preaching of the Good News, the first woman to preach in a Massachusetts town.

1645

Lady Deborah Moody funds the first public school in America, the first public school in America, the first public school in America.
