Stephen Middleton is professor and director of African American Studies at Mississippi State University. His interdisciplinary training is in law and history, with a research agenda on race and law. He holds the doctorate from Miami University (Ohio) and completed the first-year curriculum in law at New York University School of Law. He has lectured at Cambridge University, Keele University, and presented papers at the British Legal History Association and the British Association of American Studies in the United Kingdom. Dr. Middleton is the author of Ohio and the Antislavery Activities of Salmon P. Chase, The Black Laws in the Old Northwest: A Documentary History, Black Congressmen During Reconstruction: A Documentary Sourcebook, and The Black Laws: Race and the Legal Process in Early Ohio. He is currently working on a biography of Judge Robert Heberton Terrell. His topic will be biographies as history: Jeremiah Finney and Robert Herberton Terrell.
